The unusual hills, hollows, outcroppings, earthquakes, and local legends have led some historians and archeologists to wonder whether it was a Native American site before it was a Christian village. John Hanson Mitchell, noted author of *Ceremonial Time* and other books on the local landscape, will discuss his conclusions on the Native American history of this site. Free. 978 264-9641
